AAUW NATIONAL ELECTION

This is the first time that all members will be allowed to cast a vote for National Board members, Public Policy Program, and amendments to the By-Laws. In the past these votes were cast by our delegates at the National Convention where people running for office campaigned with vigor. Delegates received printed flyers, and numerous little “freebies” ranging from tape measures to bookmarks with names imprinted. Booths were available with information on issues.

Now we have one member-one vote. How will you know whom and what to choose? Your Outlook has information on all the candidates and explains all the issues. In addition, the candidates have been sending their campaign literature to the Branch Presidents, so Ritchie will bring all she has received to the May meeting.

One item is EXTREMELY IMPORTANT and needs your careful scrutiny. This is the change to the membership requirement. At present one must hold a degree from an accredited college or university in order to become a member of AAUW. It now includes Associate degrees as well as Bachelor and above. The big change is to open membership to anybody who supports our mission and no longer require a college or university degree. There are strong feelings on both sides of this debate. Some feel this is the best way in increase membership and participation, others feel that this is what makes our group unique and honors our accomplishments.

Read your Outlook for information on this issue as well as other By-Law changes. We will have a discussion on these at our May meeting. However you choose to vote, please vote!

HOW CAN YOU VOTE IN THE NATIONAL ELECTION?

A voter guide is included in the most recent Spring/Summer 2015 Outlook Magazine. The back of the magazine has your Membership Number and an individual PIN highlighted in yellow to be used on-line. Note, this not the same as your password for use with the membership database system. Go to www.aauw.org/resource/national-election and click on the VOTE button. If you prefer to vote with a paper ballot, call 800-326-2289 before May 8 and a ballot will be mailed to you and must be postmarked by May 26. On-line voting concludes at the National Convention June 19.

Out on Dome creek there is a devoted little woman who is a heroine in the eyes of the miner out there, and, perhaps, one could search all the world for another one of her sex.

Mrs. F. A. Hammer, on 4 above on dome creek has the distinction, and a worthy one it is, of being the only woman engineer in the country. Not that she has to be, but it just so happens that Mr. and Mrs. Hammer are well mated. To tell the truth, they still love each other—although married a number of years—a rare occurrence. And it is Mrs. Hammer's proudest moment when she can go into the engine room and run the hoist in order to relieve her husband in case he has duties which call him away for the time being.

At first Mr. Hammer protested against his wife going around the greasy machin-
